January is National Human Trafficking Prevention Month

January is National Human Trafficking Prevention Month – an important time to reflect on the resilience of trafficking survivors and recognize the efforts of those who work tirelessly to prevent and eliminate this inhumane and devastating form of abuse and exploitation.

This month, federal and state agencies, community partners, advocates, and individuals seek to raise awareness of this crime, recognizing that every one of us can play an important role in the fight against human trafficking. OCYF advocates to grow awareness about this crime. Human trafficking continues to increase because of its covert nature, misconceptions about its prevalence and what types of individuals are vulnerable to become victims, and the lack of awareness about its indicators. In addition to the Serving Child Victim of Human Trafficking in Pennsylvania Bulletin, the Policy Division has hosted a wide array of trainings and is ready to provide technical assistance to CCYAs in their efforts to better support the children and families they serve.

Topic Updates

CITIZEN REVIEW PANELS (CRPs)—Shannon Walborn

The CRPs are comprised of volunteer members who meet in their respective regions and, while influenced by local, regional, and statewide concerns, are charged with making recommendations for statewide improvements. The CRPs and the Department of Human Services collaborate each year to release the Citizen Review Panels' Annual Report.

To end 2024, three regional CRPs were representing the Commonwealth: North Central, Southeast, and Southwest. It is vital that the CRPs be committed to a membership that welcomes and embraces equity and diversity. There is also the statewide CRP consisting of Pennsylvania's longstanding Youth Advisory Board (YAB). The Statewide YAB is comprised of youth and alumni of the child welfare system ages 16 to 23 years of age.

In 2022, Pennsylvania's Regional CRPs began a five-year rotation to ensure representation and inclusion of all regions in the Commonwealth.

Recruitment in 2024 focused on the establishment of a regional panel in the Northwest region, an area of the Commonwealth that has not hosted a CRP since 2014. Recruitment efforts for the Northwest panel resulted in 11 applications representing five of the 13 counties in the region. After the required screening and selection process, 11 applicants were selected to represent the Northwest region, with 9 accepting membership beginning in January 2025. As the new panel was created, the Southwest panel concluded its work in December 2024.

Moving forward with the panel rotation, 2025 will be used for mid-term recruitment to the Southeast, North Central, and Northwest panels, if necessary.

The 2024 Citizen Review Panel Annual Report has been received by OCYF. The panels have made various recommendations and OCYF is currently drafting responses to those recommendations. Once finalized, this report will be released to the public and is able to be viewed on the Child Welfare Resource Center Pennsylvania Citizen Review Panels - Annual Reports (pitt.edu) webpage.

EDUCATION—Dawn Traill

On November 15, 2024, the U.S. Departments of Education and Health and Human Services released joint federal non-regulatory guidance to promote educational stability and success for students in foster care. This non-regulatory guidance is an update and rescinds the 2016 non-regulatory guidance.

DHS and PDE will collaborate to update joint guidance for Pennsylvania.

On January 16, 2025, OCYF Policy Division staff Dawn Traill co-presented an interactive workshop with Emily Peeler from the American Bar Association. This interactive workshop was designed for County Children and Youth Agency staff to engage with peers and experts to share best practices, insights, and strategies for success. This session guided participants in developing SMARTIE — Strategic, Measurable, Ambitious, Realistic, Time-bound, Inclusive, and Equitable — goals designed to promote educational stability for children and youth in agency custody that can be implemented in their county.

UNIVERSAL ASSESSMENT (UA) TOOL—Erik Walters

The Division of Policy remains active with its support of system partners as planning, development, and eventual implementation of the Pennsylvania Universal Assessment continues into the New Year. While the final months of 2024 placed an emphasis on making decisions regarding intervals, safety, family service planning and best practices when it comes to safety planning, the UA Statewide Meeting will begin work in 2025 by placing an emphasis on case documentation. The first UA Statewide Meeting was held on January 9, 2025. The next UA Statewide Meeting is scheduled for February 13, 2025.

In addition to monthly UA Statewide Meetings, the UA Implementation Team continues to convene with efforts focused on Communication Planning and Vignette Development to support the UA Certification Process; the next UA Implementation Team Meeting is scheduled for January 23, 2025.

Lastly, the New Year will usher in the formation of two intersession work groups: Pilot Design Workgroup and Response Times Workgroup.

CHILD ABUSE RECOGNITION AND REPORTING TRAININGS—Gerry Lynn Butler

Effective January 1, 2025, the Department of Human Services (DHS) is no longer accepting new Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting Training Curricula for review and approval. All Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting Trainings that are currently approved by DHS will maintain approval.

All Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting Training Curricula that were submitted to DHS prior to January 1, 2025 will be reviewed as outlined in the <u>Curriculum Approval Guidelines</u>. All approved providers must update their curriculum and submit for DHS approval when legislative changes occur to the Child Protective Services Law.

Individuals or organizations who need to take a Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting Training may still use any of the curricula that are on the approved list of courses.

Additional information related to approved providers of a Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting Training can be found on the <u>DHS Keep Kids Safe Trainings webpage</u>. DHS will continue to monitor the number of approved curricula to ensure there is sufficient training available for mandated reporters.

OCYF TRAUMA TEAM—Jennifer Newman

The OCYF Trauma Team would like to announce the release of trauma-sensitive training for Congregate Care providers entitled, *Developing Trauma Sensitivity for Congregate Care Staff.* This training can be found on the Child Welfare Resource Center's E-learn Catalog #2506. Trauma-sensitive training for foster care and adoption providers will be available in 2025.

CROSS SYSTEM UPDATES—Jennifer Newman

The Medicaid bulletin (MAB) <u>99-24-08</u>, <u>Pennsylvania's Early and Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) Program Periodicity Schedule</u> was released on October 29, 2024. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) made changes to footnotes in their 2024 Periodicity Schedule; however, none of the changes affected the content or requirements of Pennsylvania's Periodicity Schedule as reflected in the MAB.

The Office of Income Maintenance (OIM) has announced that the SUN Bucks benefits were available for recipient use for four months from the date of issuance, and expungements of remaining SUN Bucks funds began on December 19, 2024. This will continue to be an annual benefit and must be used within the set timeframes.

VOLUNTEER RESOLUTION AGREEMENT (VRA)—Shannon Walborn

OCYF Policy would like to remind CCYAs, licensed providers, and non-licensed contractors that the second round of required VRA training is available through E-Learn (hosted by CWRC). This training has been approved by the Office of Civil Rights and meets the requirements of the VRA. This version is specific to the second round of training. Staff who took the training before July 30, 2024 must take the training again before July 30, 2025. All new staff must complete this training within sixty (60) calendar days of the employment start date.

Publications

Federal Legislative Updates

- The Supporting America's Children and Families Act was signed into law on January 4, 2025. The bipartisan act reauthorizes Title IV-B of the Social Security Act for five years and makes reforms to modernize the program. The Act:
 - Requires the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to reduce paperwork and data reporting for state agencies and caseworkers by at least 15%
 - Streamlines access to funding for Indian tribes
 - Supports the expansion of evidence-based services to prevent child abuse and neglect and ensures children are not separated from parents solely due to poverty-related neglect
 - Ensures caseworkers have access to training and support to improve retention and recruitment
 - Strengthens support systems for kinship care providers
 - Includes individuals formerly in foster care in state service planning and ensures youth have access to mental health services up to age 26
 - Requires HHS to review post-adoption supports provided under Title IV-B and identify opportunities to strengthen them

- The Jenna Quinn Law was signed into law on December 23, 2024, amending the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act to provide grants in support of training and education to teachers and other school employees students, and the community about how to prevent, recognize, respond to, and report child sexual abuse among primary and secondary school students. <u>Text S.1147 118th Congress</u> (2023-2024): Jenna Quinn Law | Congress.gov | Library of Congress
- The Stop Institutional Child Abuse Act was signed into law on December 23, 2024, requiring HHS to study the nature, prevalence, severity, and scope of child abuse, neglect, and deaths in youth residential programs. The Act also requires recommendations be made to improve the coordination and implementation of best practices regarding youth health, safety, care, and treatment in residential programs. - The Native American Child Protection Act was signed into law on December 23, 2024. This Act amends the Indian Child Protection and Family Violence Prevention Act to encourage the use of grants for culturally appropriate treatment services and programs, and allows for the use of program funds for operational costs and child protective services. The Act also provides a requirement for the provision of additional support, training, and assistance to Indian tribes, tribal organizations, and urban Indian organizations.
