

# Clarification on Eligibility and Enrollment for Waiver Reserved Capacity for Students Who are in School or Individuals Who are Under Age 21

# **ODP Announcement 25-053**

#### **AUDIENCE:**

Office of Developmental Programs' (ODP) Administrative Entities (AEs), Providers, and Supports Coordination Organizations (SCOs)

### **PURPOSE:**

This clarification is provided to assist SCOs and AEs in properly identifying and planning for individuals who may be eligible for enrollment in the Person/Family Directed Support (P/FDS) Waiver through reserved capacity provisions.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

**Eligibility Overview for High School Graduate Reserved Capacity** 

## **Waiver Reserved Capacity Use**

AEs must continue to reserve waiver capacity for high school students who are
not eligible to complete a full year of education in their final year (e.g., those
aging out before the end of the school year). This does not include the extension
until age 22. AEs should continue to enroll at age 21.

Individuals that do not meet emergency Prioritization of Urgency of Need for

Services (PUNS) criteria can still be enrolled under reserved capacity as outlined

in the P/FDS Waiver.

NOTE: Per the Pennsylvania Department of Education, students eligible under the

federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) are entitled to a Free and

Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) until their 22nd birthday. This means a student

who would typically exit high school during or after the school year in which they

turn 21 may now remain enrolled until age 22. This does not change how AEs offer

P/FDS capacity at age 21.

Emergency Need vs. Reserved Capacity

Individuals identified through the High School Graduate initiative do not need to

meet the criteria for emergency need (as defined in PUNS or its successor) but

are still eligible for waiver services through reserved capacity.

Reserved capacity enrollment is permitted up to 180 days prior to the

anticipated need for services, such as graduation or school exit.

This early planning ensures timely access to services at transition points.

The High School Graduate Reserved Capacity does not preclude the prioritization of

individuals who are younger than 21 years and have an emergency PUNS. Individuals

who meet emergency criteria should continue to be prioritized for waiver enrollment

consistent with existing ODP policies regardless of their age.
