

Foundational Leadership in HCBS:

Building Expertise to Better Support People in their Homes and Communities

Course Overview

The majority of older adults and individuals living with disabilities in the U.S. want to live at home and receive services and supports there rather than live in institution-based settings. In collaboration with experts at ADvancing States, the Department of Health Policy and Management at UNC Chapel Hill (HPM) has created this online certificate program to address the growing need for expertise in administering the nation's Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) programs. Over the course of this 10-week training, you will learn more about the populations utilizing long term services and supports (LTSS), the organizations and individuals providing LTSS, and the varied sources of funding for LTSS with an emphasis on HCBS. We also will explore the key policies in the area, including the Older Americans Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act and Medicare/Medicaid and processes by which individuals access services.

Course Placement and Participants

The HCBS Leadership course is open to professionals serving in state and local government and private LTSS professionals of all education and experience backgrounds. The HCBS leadership training participants will have the best learning experience if they have at least six months of experience in LTSS or adjacent health system work before starting the course.

Course Learning Objectives

All participants that complete the HCBS Leadership Training Course will demonstrate the foundational knowledge of roles and functions of HCBS professionals.

- 1. Explain the structure, financing, and evolution of long-term services and supports (LTSS) in the United States
- 2. Analyze the populations served by LTSS and HCBS.
- 3. Compare the different Medicaid authorities and programs used to deliver HCBS.
- 4. Assess the roles and responsibilities of providers, service coordinators, and other stakeholders in the delivery and management of HCBS.
- 5. Evaluate systems and processes involved in eligibility, enrollment, and service planning for HCBS.

6. Apply principles of independence, and participant-centered care in the planning and delivery of LTSS.
